

**Governors Annual Statement
2021 – 2022**

This year's focus has been to get back to normal for our children. Our key priority has been to raise standards in reading and phonics, whilst resuming wider opportunities to enhance the curriculum. Mental health and wellbeing has been another priority, through targeted support and maximizing outdoor learning. These are some of the key highlights of the year.
